## **Strategic Planning Report**

The year 2016 was a planning year for the board of the Fort Atkinson Historical Society and staff of the Museum. For most of the year, the board and staff of the Museum were engaged in strategic planning with the assistance of Steve Grabow from the UW-Extension office. After many thought-provoking conversations and discussions regarding the future vision for the museum, the board and staff agreed to a strategic plan for the Museum that focuses on four areas: Education, Marketing, Facility Management, and Fundraising. The planning process also included revisions to our mission statement to better align with our current practices and future goals. The desired result of the strategic plan: the Museum will continue to be both a strong local history museum as well as a regional destination, and the good work started here generations ago will continue for generations to come.

#### The Past is our Future:

The Fort Atkinson Historical Society's Vision for the Hoard Historical Museum

Who Are We: The Hoard Historical Museum is a local history museum with a national story.

Founded in 1933 by community organizations and local community leaders, the Museum continues to be a focal point that fosters pride within our community. The Museum is a learning, meeting and public-friendly space, that also serves as the archives for the entire community which protects OUR history.

The Museum began in the Dwight Foster Library and moved to the Frank and Luella Hoard House in 1957. The Museum has built additions, including the National Dairy Shrine museum (constructed 1980-1981), and most recently, a major addition of more than 13,000 square feet in 2007-2008. The Museum building now consists of more than 36,000 square feet. The Museum is also home to the Dwight and Almira Foster House, built in 1841 and moved to the Museum's grounds in 1969. The Museum continues to be free of charge for all visitors.

The Hoard Historical Museum is a partnership between the Fort Atkinson Historical Society, the City of Fort Atkinson, and the National Dairy Shrine. The Fort Atkinson Historical Society, founded in 1939, has over 400 members and business patrons who annually support the Museum.

Our mission: The mission of the Hoard Historical Museum is to preserve, protect and promote the history and culture of Fort Atkinson and the surrounding area from its earliest inhabitants to the present day.

To achieve this mission, the Hoard Historical Museum will:

- Collect and preserve artifacts and documents relating to our history,
- Interpret and share the history and culture of the area via programs, exhibits and publications,
- Promote the importance of protecting and telling our history,
- Honor the area's dairy heritage by serving as a venue for the National Dairy Shrine's museum,
- Work with other municipal departments, historical agencies, and community organizations, and
- Operate in accordance with the most current and professional museum standards practicable for the education and enjoyment of its visitors and the community.

## Hoard House Project Update

The original heart of our museum, the Hoard House was a home before it became a museum. The house was built by Ruben White in 1864 and lived in by the White, Hagemann, Chambers, and Dexheimer families before it became the Hoard House in 1909 when Frank and Luella Hoard moved in along with their two children, Bill Jr. and Shirley. Frank was the youngest son of William Dempster Hoard, Wisconsin's 16th Governor and the founder of Hoard's Dairyman Magazine and the Jefferson County Union. After Frank passed away in 1939, Luella remained in her home alongside a few schoolteachers who lived there as boarders. After Luella passed away in 1956, Shirley and Bill gave their family home to the city of Fort Atkinson. They intended the building be used as a museum, which at the time was housed in the basement of the Dwight Foster library. After 1957, the Museum, now renamed the Hoard Historical Museum in honor of the Hoard family, continued to develop and grow. In 1980, the National Dairy Shrine's Visitor Center construction began and was dedicated in 1981. In 2007, the Museum added new exhibit spaces, a secure archive, collection storage rooms, and gallery space.

Our museum has always been driven to maintain a high standard in exhibits and programs. To this end, the walls of the Hoard House recently underwent a makeover with plasterwork and paint. Volunteer Guy Horton worked to patch and plaster the holes and weak spots in plaster that is more than 100 years old. During the two weeks that the Museum was closed for maintenance, our maintenance man, Greg, organized our wonderful volunteers to paint. Volunteers Bob Heussner, Carolyn & Russ Nord, Harriet Scherer, Joe Slaney, and John Syens worked in 4-hour shifts to paint the parlor, library, first and second floor hallways, and stairwell. Thank you to all of our volunteers who worked to make the Hoard House feel like a home again!

All of the paint colors selected were chosen by visitors. In December, visitors were given the opportunity to vote for their favorite paint color from several staff-approved colors for the hallway, library, and parlor. For those of you who voted, you may notice that the parlor is now blue rather than the pinks you voted on. During the voting, we had several write-in votes for a blue and one visitor voted and then returned with a paint swatch of the color he suggested on his ballot. Well, to be fair, we took the blue votes into consideration. Staff and volunteers then voted in a runoff election and decided that the blue was perfect for the room (and still historically appropriate). Thank you to all who voted, painted, and helped make the Hoard House feel like a home again!

Where Are We Now: Our Museum's stories draw visitors from near and far to experience Fort Atkinson and the surrounding area.

Each year, roughly 20,000 people visit the Museum and National Dairy Shrine. Our exhibits, programs and events attract local citizens, schoolchildren from the greater regional area, as well as by visitors from other Wisconsin towns, states, and foreign countries. Each year the Museum hosts programs designed to educate local, regional, national and international visitors regarding the history and culture of the area. Our strength is in the diversity of stories we have to tell regarding the history of our local area.

The facility also serves as a community meeting space and hosts local organizations, businesses, and civic groups in our meeting rooms. In addition, the museum provides a venue for art shows that showcase the artists of the region.

Two museum professionals work full time as City employees in conjunction with five part-time Fort Atkinson Historical Society employees. The Museum benefits from having more than 200 volunteers to help fulfill our annual programming.

The Museum's finances are a combination of funding from the City of Fort Atkinson and Fort Atkinson Historical Society. The National Dairy Shrine makes an annual contribution.

Where Do We Want To Be: The Museum, with its strong foundations in the community, is poised for greatness.

The Museum intends to be a regional destination with robust local roots, greeting more visitors from around the world and around the corner. To grow, the Museum needs to strengthen its sustainable financial support, add more members to its membership roll, ensure that exhibits are updated in a timely manner, and add more outreach programs to be certain that all segments of the community are aware of the Museum and its mission.

To reach these goals and help the Museum move forward, the Fort Atkinson Historical Society, the representatives from the City of Fort Atkinson, and National Dairy Shrine and Museum staff have agreed upon four areas on which to focus efforts to see these goals come to fruition.

The areas are: Education, Marketing, Facility Management, and Fundraising.

#### 1. Education: Programming, Exhibits, and Outreach

The Museum prides itself in its strong programming but intends to strengthen its offerings to ensure that the Museum is reaching out to all segments of the community. To improve programming, the Museum will:



- Evaluate and assess current programs,
- Develop the themes on which to focus our programs,
- Develop new, specific program ideas,
- Ensure up-to-date technology to support our programs and exhibits,
- Ensure our exhibits are reflective of our mission and stories while utilizing the collection, and
- Work with schools, community organizations and businesses to expand our outreach programming.

#### 2. Marketing:

The Museum, while looking to become a regional or



statewide destination, will also remember the ongoing support of the local community. To improve upon the effectiveness of the Museum's current marketing approach, the Museum will:

- Hire a marketing/programming employee to assist with marketing, the creation of a marketing plan, and social media for the Museum.
- Devise a marketing plan complete with objectives and evaluation techniques, and establish a clear message of what we are marketing and to whom.

#### 3. Facility Management:

With the 1841 Foster frame house, the 1864 Hoard brick home, and several major additions including the 1981 National Dairy Shrine and the 2008 expansion, the Museum building and grounds pose unique challenges and responsibilities. Maintenance



costs are currently split between the City of Fort Atkinson and the Fort Atkinson Historical Society. The Museum will:

- Develop a detailed maintenance plan, a schedule and a capital program document to guide implementation,
- Provide assurance that specific project needs, with priority considerations by both the Board and staff, are included in facility upgrade plans, and
- Continue to explore new developments for the Museum and grounds.

#### 4. Fundraising:

The Museum looks to add to our revenue base in new and effective ways while maintaining strong support from key stakeholders. The Museum will:



- Assess the best ways to add revenue,
- Develop a program around planned giving,
- Focus on new ways to obtain more memberships as the most promising approach for adding to our revenue base,
- Explore the effectiveness of the gift shop as a revenue source, and
- Host fundraising events.

## From the Archive

Last year, Archive Assistant Barbara Orlando was working with the Caswell family file and discovered this note from Valentine's Day, 1852, to Lucian B. Caswell from "Maybee." We believe "Maybee" was his first wife Elizabeth Hannah May, daughter of Chester May. The couple was married in 1855.

### **Garden Education Program**

Saturday, March 4, 2 p.m. Native Plants Part I

The Jefferson County Master Gardener Volunteers at the Hoard Historical Museum are planning five new Garden Education Programs for 2017. **Garden Education Programs start at 2 p.m. on scheduled days and are free to attend.** 

Three of our programs this year will be about Native Plants. We will present Native Plants, Part 1 on Saturday, March 4, at 2 p.m. This program will review how native plants are classified based on their preferred amount of light, water, and soil type. We will a look at various natural habitats and how plants from those habitats can be incorporated into a home garden. This program will also discuss why gardeners might want to include native plants in their landscape.

Native Plants, Part 2 will be presented Saturday, May 13. This program will introduce specific herbaceous native plants and their characteristics. We will also answer the question, "What is a nativar?"

Our third Native Plants program, scheduled on October 21, is on woody native plants – trees, shrubs, and vines. We will discuss the benefits of incorporating native plants into your landscape, including the benefits in using them rather than imported species.

Our final one-hour program will incorporate the Museum's programming theme of World War I. The November 18 program will be WWI Victory Gardens. Even though Victory Gardens are generally linked more to WWII, they were also utilized in WWI. This program will enlighten modern gardeners about Victory Gardens in general, and will include some information about programs from that time period.

This year's half-day Seminar will be all about Perennial Gardens. It will be presented on September 23 from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Seminar attendees will learn about Perennial Garden design, best practices for care throughout the growing season, and our favorite plants. *Admission is free, but we ask you to register prior to the event to ensure we have sufficient materials for all attendees.*
